If you are interested in serving on the CEC as a CIA, please reach out to Cheryl or Kendall.</li> <li>Marijuana Workgroup: Looking to identify members interested in working on Marijuana prevention education as well as identifying and/or developing a positive norms campaign (environmental strategy).</li> <li>Cpl. Frasier, cannabis initiative update: as anticipated, the first (in a while) initiative for Cannabis legalization in Idaho is starting to gain traction. The group Idaho Medical Marijuana Association (formerly Compassionate Idaho) are the ones behind it. Below is a list of pertinent details. If passed, it would be the most liberal legalization in the country. Of further note, the State would receive zero revenue from the initiative. The group would need about 50,000 signatures from the 19 legislative districts in Idaho by the end of this month in order to get the measure on the ballot. It is not expected they can pull this off, but you never know.
