4:10	Guest Speaker: Idaho Anti-Trafficking Coalition Program Manager, Kevin Zielinski	 (Kevin) Idaho Anti-Trafficking Coalition's (IATC) mission: work alongside community members in providing awareness, education, services, and safe housing for victims of human trafficking. 5th year as a non-profit. Their organization focuses on education, training, awareness, advocacy, direct victim services, and referrals and information. Crisis and Resources Hotline = 2,835 calls Total Direct Victim Services for 2022 = 6.320 counts Hub in Boise, only 5 employees. One of the case mangers is bi-lingual. Human Trafficking is a form of modern-day slavery. This crime occurs when a trafficker uses FORCE, FRAUD, or COERCION to control another person for the purpose of engaging in commercial sex acts or soliciting labor or services against his/her will. Force, fraud, or coercion need not be present if the individual engaging in commercial sex under 18 years of age. Main thing about human trafficking – praying on vulnerabilities. 89% of human trafficking victims know who their traffickers are. Grooming is the process traffickers use to control and manipulate someone into human trafficking. Although the specific actions are different, traffickers usually follow the same steps. Traffickers can be anyone – sometimes they use their privilege, religion, wealth, social media, etc. When in the community he gets asked does this happen here and people are shocked that this happens in Idaho. Traffickers control their victims in a variety of ways that include: physical and/or emotional abuse, isolation from friends or family, financial abuse, and substance abuse. It is common for victims to have a substance use disorder (SUD). Traffickers exploit individuals existing opioid use or other SUDs to coerce them into sex trafficking. Additionally, trafficking victims may use substances to cope with trauma.



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	Victims of sex trafficking have a SUD, they are not properly recognized as victims. Victims are usually arrested for selling or possession
	Lack of sufficient treatment – victims who have a substance use disorder often have restricted
	or limited access to services and quality treatment. A lot of barriers when trying to reach
	victims.
	 Victims may not report crime or other victimizations because they do not trust criminal justice
	actors – particularly after an arrest.
	Post-related impacts: Suicide ideations, mental health disorders, substance use, etc.
